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Native American Development Corporation-Procurement Technical Assistance Center

Native American Development Corporation-Procurement Technical Assistance Center (NADC PTAC) was established through a Department of Defense grant to provide contract identification and procurement assistance to Native American businesses in the Rocky Mountain & Great Plains Regions of the BIA service areas. NADC PTAC helps to improve local economies by helping Native American businesses successfully compete for government contracts, thereby creating & retaining jobs and bringing economic benefits to states and local communities.

The NADC PTAC Turtle Mountain field office serves both the Turtle Mountain Chippewa reservation as well as the Spirit Lake Sioux reservation.

Eligibility:

- The business must be 51% American Indian Owned (individual or Tribal enterprise)
- For-Profit business or enterprise
- Located on or adjacent to a Federally recognized reservation within service area
- Be in business for at least one year
